# **History**

This year marks the 51st year of new play production at The Open Eye Theater. We were founded in New York City as Theater of the Open Eye in 1972, by the late famed dancer-choreographer Jean Erdman and her husband, the renowned mythologist Joseph Campbell. Renamed The Open Eye Theater, we relocated to the Catskill Mountains in 1994, where, under the leadership of producing artistic director Amie Brockway, we performed in eighteen villages and hamlets before creating a permanent home for theater in Margaretville NY, in 2006. Deborah DeLorenzo (Ismene) is a stage and film actor with German and Italian roots. She is recognized for her work in Oliver Rihs' feature film Caged Birds and the world's premiere of The Life of Vernon Subutex directed by Peter Kastenmuller at the Theatre Neumarkt in Zurich. She received the Migros Kulturprozent Award for best role during her studies at the Zurich University of Arts in Switzerland. It was there she worked with artists including Gerd Wameling (Shakespeare's Cleopatra), starred in the musical Through the night and shot a documentary alongside Devid Striesow. As the solo performer of Mnesia, co-created with her team, she won the Premio contest award in Switzerland. In 2022 the show was invited to quest perform at The Theater in Teheran. Drawn to America since childhood, she followed her artistic intuition to New York. Here she starred in Twilight of Joy at the Secret Theater and Mumtaz Hussain's Virus Bomb at the Baruch Performing Arts Center in Manhattan. She recently graduated from the American Academy of Dramatic Arts. As a wholehearted artist, Deborah explores human nature through her storytelling. She has plans to direct her own works, both stage and screen.

Darlene DeMaille (Stage Manager) was born Darlene Prince in Liberty, NY.
